I'll call 9 the roll. 10 Commissioner Werther. 11 COMMISSIONER WERTHER: Aye. 12 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Paton. 13 COMMISSIONER PATON: Aye. 14 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Chan. 15 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Aye. 16 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Chair votes aye. The 17 minutes are approved 4-to-nothing. 18 Item III, discussion and possible action on 19 the Executive Director's Report. 20 Tom. 21 MR. COLLINS: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, 22 Commissioners. You know, there's kind of a few news 23 items we wanted to update you about. The first is, as 24 you all know, Congressman Grijalva died earlier this 25 month, and as a result, there will be a special</p>
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<p>1 P R O C E E D I N G 2 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Good morning. I'm 3 Mark Kimble. I call to order the March 27th, 2025 4 meeting of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. 5 With that, we will take attendance. 6 Commissioners, please identify yourselves for the 7 record. 8 COMMISSIONER WERTHER: Christina Werther. 9 COMMISSIONER PATON: Galen Paton. 10 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Amy Chan. 11 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Chan. 12 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Yes. Sorry. I think I 13 stepped on you, but I'm here. 14 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Okay. Thank you. We have 15 a quorum for the meeting. 16 Item II, discussion and possible action on 17 minutes for the February 27th, 2025 meeting. 18 Commissioners, you have the minutes from our February 19 meeting in the packet. Is there any discussion or 20 questions? 21 (No response.) 22 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Hearing none, do I have a 23 motion to approve the minutes? 24 COMMISSIONER WERTHER: I move to approve the 25 minutes of February 27th, 2025.</p>	<p>1 election to fill his term. The prime -- there will be 2 a primary and general. The primary will be held on 3 July 15th and the general will be held on 4 September 23rd, and that will be to fill the term 5 through January 2027. 6 You know, CD7 is -- has six different 7 counties in it, and one of the things that Gina and -- 8 has already been working on with our colleagues at 9 the -- with our voter -- our debate administration is 10 to start to put together a Clean Elections debate for 11 the eligible candidates for that office, so -- so that 12 will be -- we'll go -- have more news about that as we 13 go forward. 14 The next local election is May 20th. Alec is 15 already hard at work updating the website for that, so 16 we've got -- we'll have, you know, kind of a -- we'll 17 have a little bit of a logistical thing with two 18 different election dates and managing all that, but 19 Alec's ability to reach out to the local -- localities 20 for information about the elections is unparalleled. 21 He's the -- in many ways the best election recorder in 22 the state, so -- 23 And then I think the other thing I wanted to 24 highlight -- we have the highlights -- or, some of the 25 highlights of the -- President Trump's March 25th</p>

A couple of key points. 2 First, I think, you know, from -- what's Clean 3 Elections' sort of role in this context, I think that, 4 you know, we are looking at this from a voter education 5 perspective. You know, we've already had some staff 6 discussions about that and we've, you know, been -- and 7 we've been doing research about that. Some of the 8 aspects of this order are, you know, without getting 9 into sort of the policy basis, whether or not it's good 10 or bad, it's sort of like there are -- there are a 11 couple of different aspects of the order that I think 12 are worth thinking about, and I kind of categorize them 13 as procedural issues versus sort of substantive issues. 14 On the procedures, the order -- throughout 15 the order there are -- the President orders the 16 Election Assistance Commission, which is a federal 17 commission that works on supporting election officials 18 around the country with technical advice and things 19 like that, to -- and they also administrate something 20 called a federal form, which is this form that every -- 21 anybody can use in any state to submit to their state's 22 election officials to register to vote. So it purports 23 to order the EAC to do certain things and on a certain 24 timeline. 25 And so the first procedural sort of question</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 8</p> <p>1 Substantively I think the headline that 2 you'll see in Arizona and around the country is that it 3 takes this federal form and says to the EAC, there 4 ought to be a requirement to provide some documentary 5 proof of citizenship along with the form. So, you 6 know, what does that mean? So NVRA says, we'll have a 7 federal form that anybody around the country can pick 8 up, they file it with their own election office, but 9 it's a standard form. The instructions that go with 10 that form come from the states, so -- you know, so if 11 you're in Texas, you get the form, it's a form and then 12 there's a bunch of directions and you find Texas and 13 you fill out what you're supposed to fill out for Texas 14 or Arizona or whatever. This would say, no, in 15 addition to whatever the state is saying, the federal 16 government is going to say, you need to provide this 17 documentary proof of citizenship. 18 Now, in Arizona we have a law -- we've had a 19 law for 20 years that says you've got to -- you've got 20 to do that anyways. Not the case around the country. 21 We're the only state that really has the -- there's a 22 couple states that have it on the books, but we're the 23 only state that really does that. So, you know, 24 that's -- and then what those documents are going to be 25 and --</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 7</p> <p>1 is, and it's somewhat substantive too is, you know, are 2 the things the order contemplates things that can be -- 3 can be ordered. In other words, you know, we'll talk 4 more about the federal form in a second, but the 5 National Voter Registration Act lays out a lot of 6 parameters about the federal form to begin with, right. 7 So an initial question is, you know, is there a -- does 8 that statute sort of fill the field, you know, and not 9 allow for additional regulations, or can the EAC even 10 make those regulations. 11 Next question, you know, if they don't, you 12 know, what happens. You know, that's been an argument 13 you've seen with a number of different, you know, 14 quasi independent or independent commissions with the 15 White House over the course of the last 60 days or so. 16 And then -- and then third, you know, the 17 federal form issues are supposed to go into place in 30 18 days. You know, and I can't pretend to know the answer 19 to this, but, you know, someone will look at whether or 20 not that's administratively possible, you know, whether 21 or not there's a notice period, any of those kinds of 22 things that typically like -- when we go through and we 23 make a rule change, right, we have a calendar we have 24 to operate under, so -- so those are some of the 25 procedural issues that are there.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 9</p> <p>1 You know, and the order is a little -- I 2 mean, there's -- and there's already -- you know, as 3 we're tracking the discussion among policy experts and 4 lawyers, there's some discussion about, you know, what 5 documents are going to fit and what are not. And 6 that's something, for example, as we look at it for 7 voter education purposes, we want to make sure we have 8 that nailed down before we start promulgating sort of a 9 Q and A type of document on that that's authoritative. 10 Similarly, you know, it will -- it would ask 11 the EAC to decertify certain election equipment, when 12 that's not been the EAC's practice. The EAC's regime 13 currently would be that they create standards to which 14 election-related equipment gets certified, they upgrade 15 those standards. And in fact, they have upgraded those 16 standards; I'm not sure that the equipment is actually 17 there yet. But they never have said that the old 18 standards don't count, right. It's been an upgrade, 19 not a discontinuation. So that's a -- that's a -- 20 that's a significant change in policy, which, you know, 21 we'll see. 22 Now, other things that are there. There's a 23 directive that in federal elections a state that 24 collects ballots after election day that are postmarked 25 before election day, so California has a big -- that's</p>

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<p>1 why -- one of the reasons why California takes, you 2 know, a decade to count their votes is because -- this 3 would say, you can't do that, and there will be some 4 penalty if you do. That doesn't affect Arizona, 5 because Arizona has a deadline of 7:00 p.m. on election 6 day to return ballots, and it's a hard deadline. 7 Similarly, there is a provision in there that 8 says you have to have some kind of paper audit trail or 9 some kind of -- everything documented on paper. 10 Arizona uses paper ballots and has a -- and has a 11 verified paper audit trail, so, again, we're already 12 there on that. 13 So I think there are groups -- and with 14 anything -- and, I mean, not to sort of lean into my 15 own somewhat dated experience with this, but we've -- 16 you know, we've been involved in litigating this issue, 17 and I think everybody who's ever worked at the Attorney 18 General's Office or at the Secretary's Office has been 19 in some way or another for the last 20 years, or the 20 Governor's Office. You know, there are groups of folks 21 who are less likely to have access -- ready access to 22 those kind of documents. That's -- that's been the 23 reality. And the studies generally indicate that 24 they're older people, younger people, folks who live in 25 rural areas, and that kind of thing. So, you know,</p>	<p>1 some -- I don't remember the exact percentage, but 2 there is a relatively small percentage of voters who 3 are what we in Arizona call federal only voters, that 4 is, they haven't yet provided documentary proof of 5 citizenship. So one question folks will have to 6 answer, and I don't -- I have an instinct, but not an 7 answer to, is, does this affect them, right, in some 8 kind of way. 9 The goal of most election administrators 10 around the state has been to try to get federal only 11 voters to provide that very proof of citizenship so 12 that they are full voters, but for federal purposes, 13 you know, they're registered and they can vote in these 14 elections. The thing is not expressly retroactive, so, 15 you know -- you know, maybe not. 16 And then that gets into, Commissioner Paton, 17 I think one of the procedural aspects of this, which 18 is, folks will litigate this and maybe a lawsuit gets 19 filed that says 30 days is too soon because we have 20 this pending election. So whatever the impact is, it 21 ought not go into place for this election in CD7. 22 COMMISSIONER PATON: Now, when I worked at 23 the DES, you know, you had to have -- you had to -- you 24 had to be a U.S. citizen to apply and so on. 25 MR. COLLINS: Right.</p>
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<p>1 that's a real -- that's a real thing. 2 However, you know, when we think about this, 3 it's also important to bear in mind that, you know, 4 the -- you know, one hopes that the -- what the rules 5 are going to be gets established relatively quickly, 6 that's what all folks in elections hope, and that we're 7 able to communicate clearly and prepare people in a 8 manner that is -- anybody from any party and anywhere 9 can understand clearly what the -- what they're going 10 to need to do. 11 COMMISSIONER PATON: I have a question. 12 MR. COLLINS: Please. Sorry. 13 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Paton. 14 COMMISSIONER PATON: So would this affect 15 this new Grijalva election then? 16 MR. COLLINS: Right. That's a good question. 17 So I can say that -- that the folks are looking at that 18 and concerned about it. 30 days is a tight timeline to 19 make those kind of changes as contemplated, so -- the 20 number of voters who use the federal form to register 21 to vote is not -- it's not a large number of voters. 22 Most voters go through MVD and this just -- and this 23 all happens in the background and they don't even know 24 it, right. 25 And then in CD7 there's -- you know, there's</p>	<p>1 COMMISSIONER PATON: If people were born in 2 Arizona, we could -- we could find that out easily. 3 There is a database or whatever. If they were not born 4 in Arizona, like Utah or somewhere else or obviously 5 foreign countries, then we couldn't tell. So maybe 6 that might help; I don't know. 7 MR. COLLINS: Yeah. Well, no, that's -- 8 Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Paton, that's exactly right. 9 There's a -- there's a -- there are efforts made and 10 the Legislature has directed election officials to make 11 efforts to, you know, confirm the citizenship of folks 12 who have -- who have registered to vote. I think that, 13 you know, this order purports to make more information 14 available to election officials at the federal level. 15 I'm not -- there's a little debate I've seen about 16 whether or not that's, in fact, possible in terms of 17 the data that is available, you know. But this has 18 been an ongoing -- you know, in our 20 years in Arizona 19 of doing this, you know, getting access to those 20 databases for this purpose has been -- has been a 21 challenge for sure. 22 I think the other thing you'll see written up 23 about on this is that, you know, there's a sort of -- 24 and I don't know exactly how this will work yet, but 25 there will be a review by the Department of Government</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 14</p> <p>1 Efficiency, or DOGE, of voter lists. That's going to 2 be done in conjunction with the Department of Homeland 3 Security. The first Trump administration had a 4 committee that attempted to do something along these 5 lines that generated some controversy. So, again, you 6 know, it's not clear yet how that will -- how that will 7 work out.</p> <p>8 So I just want to really quick kind of 9 conclude by saying, you know, I think that our goal as 10 staff will be to try to provide voters with the top 11 line of, how does this affect me, if at all, right, and 12 then the second line of, you know, sort of as much as 13 we can, what else is going on here, you know, but 14 really with the idea that -- that there are going to be 15 multiple audiences for a thing like this, right, 16 there's going to be -- there's a news media audience 17 that really wants to get into the mechanics of election 18 administration and, you know, how this is going to -- 19 you know, how this is going to mess with that, and, you 20 know, there's an audience in the political sphere of 21 sort of cheerleaders and folks who are really upset 22 about this that is going to be part of that 23 conversation as well.</p> <p>24 I think, and I hope I'm speaking on behalf of 25 all of us on staff correctly, but that if -- that to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 16</p> <p>1 this is where I think -- just if I can make a little 2 pitch here for the debate program, this is one of the 3 ways in which the debate program supports educating 4 voters more broadly about who can participate in these 5 elections, right, by having a program that highlights 6 the fact there is an election, here are the candidates, 7 it gives us all an opportunity to bring people in to 8 talk about those things. But yes, you're absolutely 9 right, any registered voter who's an -- you know, will 10 be able to participate in the primary, and if they're 11 an independent they can select a Democratic or 12 Republican ballot.</p> <p>13 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Thank you.</p> <p>14 COMMISSIONER PATON: I have a question or --</p> <p>15 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Paton.</p> <p>16 COMMISSIONER PATON: Is there something that 17 we can do to like alert the media about that down 18 there?</p> <p>19 MR. COLLINS: Well, yeah. I mean, we -- I 20 think that --</p> <p>21 COMMISSIONER PATON: Maybe do like a radio 22 show or a TV -- whatever, get interviewed.</p> <p>23 MR. COLLINS: Yeah. No, I --</p> <p>24 COMMISSIONER PATON: Because you're not 25 wearing your beard.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 15</p> <p>1 the extent that we can help voters delineate what 2 affects them, what doesn't affect them -- one of the 3 things that will be immediately confusing to folks, I 4 can tell you, is, does Arizona do this stuff on paper. 5 Oh, we don't think Arizona does -- Arizona has always 6 done this stuff on paper. That's just -- that's one of 7 those myths that's out there.</p> <p>8 So like, you know, sort of recapitulating, 9 hey, look, no, this is stuff we do. We have these -- 10 these things in place. You know, so voters, when they 11 go to our website, you know, have the ability to make 12 sure I know what affects me, if anything, what doesn't 13 affect me hopefully, to the extent we can -- you know, 14 we can sort that out, you know, and then -- and then -- 15 but most importantly, have, you know, solid, neutral, 16 reliable information.</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: And as far as the primary 18 goes in the -- in the Grijalva election, independents 19 will be able to vote, to ask for either a Republican or 20 Democratic ballot, as they can in any other primary 21 election, but that's something I think we're going to 22 have to remind people about, because they can never 23 remember that.</p> <p>24 MR. COLLINS: No, that's a good point, and 25 I -- and I think we'll do that. And I think -- and</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 17</p> <p>1 MR. COLLINS: That's right. We had a -- we 2 had a -- we had a PR consultant years ago that hated 3 the beard. They really told me that over time.</p> <p>4 Yeah, I think that that's something that we 5 can -- we can help out with and we'll try to. You 6 know, I think that -- what I -- what I think is 7 going -- will be -- you know, one of the things that's 8 good about campaigns is, generally speaking, candidates 9 want people to vote, right, I mean, you know -- and so 10 one of the things that we always try to bear in mind is 11 that candidates, independent expenditure groups, other 12 folks are all pulling the same direction when it comes 13 to -- well, not all, but the mainstream ones that are 14 following the rules are pulling, and the ones that are 15 not -- are outside of that mainstream are usually not 16 as effective as -- hopefully as them. ROBERTS: Hi. Good morning,</p> <p>8 Commissioners. Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>9 Actually, it was Alec and I who were able to drive up</p> <p>10 to Coconino County and visit with the Coconino County</p> <p>11 Elections Department, their Elections Director and</p> <p>12 staff, as well as the Coconino County Recorder, who is</p> <p>13 a newly elected recorder.</p> <p>14 This is part of our voter education plan for</p> <p>15 2025, to go out to all 15 of our counties and meet with</p> <p>16 them directly and just get a better understanding of</p> <p>17 what our Counties feel like they need from a voter</p> <p>18 education standpoint, but also to sometimes introduce</p> <p>19 Clean Elections. Again, with what</p> <p>24 Tom was referencing earlier, Alec's ability to reach</p> <p>25 out to the Counties and obtain that election</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 20</p> <p>1 participate in that process that the Counties are</p> <p>2 putting on, and so it's been great to partner with the</p> <p>3 Counties and support that.</p> <p>4 For example, Alec has worked closely with</p> <p>5 Coconino this year in developing new signage that is</p> <p>6 placed at the polling place that helps the voters</p> <p>7 understand, okay, where do I go, where is the 75-foot</p> <p>8 limit, what ID is needed, things to that extent. And</p> <p>9 then just hearing from the new recorder too about,</p> <p>10 okay, you know, these are some of the challenges that</p> <p>11 we are looking forward to this year, that we expect.</p> <p>12 How do we talk to voters about these?</p> <p>13 One, again, being documentary proof of</p> <p>14 citizenship, how do we communicate that. You know, how</p> <p>15 do we reach these voters specifically that might be a</p> <p>16 little more impacted, such as our college students.</p> <p>17 Our college students need a lot of help just with their</p> <p>18 situation. You know, they're away from home the first</p> <p>19 time, they may not have immediate access to, you know,</p> <p>20 their birth certificate, for example. Do they know</p> <p>21 where their permanent residence is? You know, are they</p> <p>22 living in a dorm? Do they want to vote back home?</p> <p>23 Just the process for our students and what that looks</p> <p>24 like.</p> <p>25 And again, you know, having access to the</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 19</p> <p>1 information firsthand and quickly is critical to making</p> <p>2 sure that our website is updated accurately.</p> <p>3 But with Coconino County, we had a great</p> <p>4 opportunity to go and visit their new elections</p> <p>5 facility, which was phenomenal. We were able to see</p> <p>6 all of the security measures that they have in place</p> <p>7 and how they operate, how they count their ballots,</p> <p>8 their warehouse, basically everything that they have</p> <p>9 that is really important to the transparency of the</p> <p>10 process for the voters up there, as well as the</p> <p>11 political observers.</p> <p>12 So in our conversations we were able to,</p> <p>13 again, get down to what is it that the Counties need in</p> <p>14 terms of voter education, how can we support you, what</p> <p>15 went well, what, you know, were some of the challenges</p> <p>16 that you experienced in 2024, and what are</p> <p>17 opportunities to partner.</p> <p>18 One of the biggest takeaways that I think</p> <p>19 that we, you know, heard is something that I think</p> <p>20 we've said all along: Our counties are so focused on</p> <p>21 putting the election on. That's where their resources</p> <p>22 are going to. That's what their staff hours are going</p> <p>23 to. They have to actually conduct the election. But</p> <p>24 we know that voter education is such a massive need,</p> <p>25 because our voters need to understand how to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 21</p> <p>1 information from the Counties is immensely helpful to</p> <p>2 us. So, for example, in this trip with Coconino one of</p> <p>3 the things that we learned was Coconino has a very</p> <p>4 informative inversion map that showcases, in each</p> <p>5 precinct, how did this precinct vote primarily, was it</p> <p>6 in person on election day or was it early voting.</p> <p>7 That's helpful to us, because then we know how to</p> <p>8 communicate with that area specifically. Do we need to</p> <p>9 really focus on, here is your voting location on</p> <p>10 election day and here is the ID that you need, or do we</p> <p>11 need to -- or do we need to focus on the messaging of,</p> <p>12 return your early ballot by this deadline, don't forget</p> <p>13 to sign it, you know, that type of thing. So</p> <p>14 understanding the behavior of voters, nobody knows that</p> <p>15 better than the County election officials.</p> <p>16 So those are just some of the examples of the</p> <p>17 discussions that came from our trip up to Coconino.</p> <p>18 Again, our goal is to visit all 15 of our counties and</p> <p>19 having this conversation with them to again understand</p> <p>20 directly from the source, what is it that these voters</p> <p>21 need. That will help shape our voter education and</p> <p>22 communication outreach to them, but again, it also</p> <p>23 makes us available to support the counties in those</p> <p>24 voter education needs, when they are so focused on</p> <p>25 actually conducting the election.</p>

Thank you 2 for correcting me that it was Alec. 3 I do want to note that you and Avery were at 4 the Tucson Festival of Books with Captain Activate. 5 Avery, if you're in a position to thank the 6 Captain, would you please do so. 7 COMMISSIONER PATON: The Captain. 8 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Yes. Thank you. 9 Any other questions or comments on the 10 Executive Director's Report? 11 (No response.) 12 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Hearing none, we'll move on 13 to Item IV, discussion and possible action on proposed 14 repayment order for Hector Jaramillo, 2024 15 participating candidate for State Legislature. The 16 next matter is the Executive Director's request that 17 the Commission issue an order that a candidate repay 18 Clean Elections funds. 19 We have the Director -- Executive Director 20 present, and Mr. Jaramillo or his representative may 21 speak if they're present. Craig Morgan is here, and he 22 will serve as the Commission's independent advisor for 23 this matter. 24 If any member of the Commission has any legal 25 questions, please, after this presentation, address</p>	<p>1 received his Clean Elections funding, Mr. Jaramillo 2 stopped filing campaign finance reports. He never 3 filed a campaign finance report related to the funds at 4 all, nor how he spent them, and he has subsequently 5 declined to participate in -- with our audits, he's 6 declined to respond to our staff inquiries, he's 7 declined to respond to formal communications from me 8 related to not just this repayment, but other aspects 9 of this that we are concerned about as staff members. 10 So in view of all that, the reality is that a 11 person who signs up to be a Clean-funded candidate 12 stipulates they're going to follow the rules, right. 13 There's a -- they sign what amounts to a contract with 14 the State that says that they'll abide by the terms and 15 conditions of this -- of the Act. So it's not just 16 that it is the law; it is, in fact, the law they've 17 agreed to follow. This is a voluntary program, and the 18 whole purpose of this is to ensure that there's more 19 transparency in the -- in the campaigns because you 20 know the source of the dollars, they're coming from the 21 people of Arizona, and, you know -- and so -- you know, 22 so we think this is -- we think, from where we're 23 sitting, you know, this is a fairly cut and dried 24 thing. 25 We don't -- we haven't heard from</p>
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<p>1 them to Craig. 2 Tom. 3 MR. COLLINS: Thank you, Commissioners. So 4 what we have before you today is a -- is a proposed 5 repayment order. We have -- in your packet you'll see 6 a couple of versions. There's a Final 3-27 that I just 7 want to note, so everybody knows, and there's a 8 strikeout version. We made some non-substantive 9 strike-throughs at -- you know, adding an apostrophe, 10 making sure we have the interest statute correct, and 11 some, you know, other typo-type changes. So the 12 order -- but those are -- those are not -- we don't 13 find them to be substantive, but -- so that's what 14 we're talking about is the document that's marked 15 Final, Final 3-27. And you also have a memo that I 16 drafted for you. 17 And all of this information, the memo, the 18 proposed order, were all sent to Mr. Jaramillo and we 19 have confirmation of delivery to his address. We've 20 also -- and it's not -- and I think that the memo and 21 the -- especially the audit report detailed that this 22 isn't our first effort to communicate with 23 Mr. Jaramillo. 24 So, you know, we really -- just to keep this 25 as simple as possible, you know, at some point after he</p>	<p>1 Mr. Jaramillo. We haven't heard from any 2 representative. I don't think there's anyone here or 3 online. There are some folks here for other parts of 4 this meeting, but, as far as I know, no one on this -- 5 on the line is here for that. 6 So while one might say, hey, maybe we should 7 take a break and like see if we can get ahold of him, I 8 would say that the record we've been able to provide to 9 you documentarily, in terms of documents, demonstrate 10 that that's not happening. And so we would encourage 11 the Commission to approve and sign the repayment order, 12 the final repayment order, and that's really -- unless 13 you have -- I mean, that's certainly the end of my 14 presentation, and I'm happy to answer any questions. 15 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: So just to summarize, 16 Mr. Jaramillo was a candidate for State House in LD24. 17 He got, for the primary election, \$31,760; we don't 18 know what he did with it -- 19 MR. COLLINS: Right. 20 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: -- and he's now vanished. 21 MR. COLLINS: That -- that is accurate. 22 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Okay. Do any Members of 23 the -- and I forgot one point. He lost in the primary. 24 MR. COLLINS: He did lose in the primary, 25 that's right.</p>

Do any Members of 2 the Commission have any questions of Tom as to the 3 facts of this matter? 4 (No response.) 5 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Okay. Thank you. 6 Is Mr. Jaramillo or any of his 7 representatives on -- they're certainly not in the 8 room. Are they on Zoom or anywhere else? If so, would 9 you please raise your hand or make yourself known 10 somehow? 11 (No response.) 12 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Not seeing anyone. 13 Okay. So at this point, Tom, you're asking 14 for a motion to -- 15 MR. COLLINS: Oh, yes. I mean, our -- yeah, 16 our request is that the Commission vote for -- you 17 know, vote in favor of the repayment order and sign it 18 and allow us to have it delivered to him properly. 19 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Has anyone -- no one has 20 talked to him at all? Our 2 preference in general with any of these things, whether 3 it's enforcement, you know, audits, those kind of 4 things, is to resolve them short of bringing them into 5 the Commission in this context. You know, that's 6 generally our preference. And so if we had another -- 7 if we felt like we had another way to do it, we would 8 do it that way. But our real sense is that -- that 9 we're -- we don't have a -- we just have no -- there's 10 nothing we have evidence of that suggests that this 11 pattern of behavior is going to change. 12 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: One other question, and I 13 don't know if this is to you or to Craig. But you are 14 not recommending a penalty, you're only recommending he 15 repay the 31,000-plus. Can you speak to that? 16 MR. COLLINS: So, yes, on your -- on the 17 Executive Director's Report every month we put active 18 enforcement matters which have an MUR number. There is 19 a complaint pending against this candidate. What our 20 point of view on this as staff is that prior -- sort of 21 prioritizing here -- the funding that he's received is 22 our top priority to begin the process of recovering 23 that. You know, whether or not this is a penalty, you 24 know, gets into a technical area related to -- you 25 know, it's in the order. So there's penalties in terms</p>

We have had a call 3 with his treasurer, I believe, where we were apprized 4 that they were -- that at least the treasurer was aware 5 that this was an issue. And I don't want to -- and 6 Mike, correct me if I'm wrong, but my recollection is 7 that effectively that person told us, yeah, yeah, I 8 know it's -- I know it's a thing, we'll get on it kind 9 of a thing, I think. Is that a fair summary, Mike, in 10 your view? 11 MR. BECKER: Yes, that's correct. 12 MR. COLLINS: Yeah, so -- so we don't have 13 reason to believe that he is deceased, you know. 14 Anecdotally, he posts on the Internet. 15 MS. THOMAS: He signed for the FedEx. 16 MR. So, I mean, we believe that he is -- you know, I 18 mean -- you know, I don't want to over characterize 19 this except to say that, I mean, we are absolutely 20 confident that he knows this is an issue and that his 21 agent, his treasurer knows this is an issue. There is 22 no way for him to have gone through the process of 23 becoming a Clean candidate without being aware that 24 you, at a minimum, have to file the reports. And so, 25 you know, we really think that this is --</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 29</p> <p>1 of, you know, what people can discharge and those kind 2 of things. And so I just want to be clear that, you 3 know, when we're talking about penalties in terms of 4 Clean Elections Act, we don't necessarily mean to say 5 it's not a penalty for purposes of other, you know, 6 things down the road in terms of collection. 7 But I think that our main goal here is to get 8 -- you know, is to get ourselves on a road to recovery 9 and then -- and then -- and then see if we can -- if we 10 can, if we have to, bring back an additional thing, an 11 additional -- an additional process. And I guess I 12 can't really get much far beyond that except to say 13 that that's consistent with how we have handled at 14 least the last repayment order we did, you know, was we 15 handled it -- not precisely. I mean, there were 16 different steps and different timings for things. 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

Summary

Prohibits the county recorders from providing an initial or updated voter registration card to a person whose mailing address is outside the state of Arizona, except for absent uniformed services voters or overseas voters as defined in the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, and persons who are residents of Arizona and who are not served by a United States Post Office.

Requires the county recorder to mail an early ballot within 48 hours of the receipt of an early ballot request, if the request is complete and correct, and made within 30 days of an election. Modifies the required wording that must be printed on the backside of an official early ballot return envelope, and the official instructions included with the early ballot. Defines the criteria an early ballot submission must meet, beginning in 2026, to be counted as an official vote. Requires that a county recorder or other officer in charge of elections provide to a qualified elector who appears at the electors designated polling location, an on-site early voting location, or any other voting location after 7:00 PM on the Friday before Election Day proof that their ballot has been tabulated, provided that elector provide identification pursuant to state law.

HB2045 - Ballot order; names; parties; rotation

Sponsor

Rep. Alexander Kolodin (R)

Summary

Removes the exclusion for alternating the names of candidates on ballots in listed elections and during listed election related activities. Requires that beginning in 2027, the parties are to be

alternated on the ballots used in each election precinct so that each party appears substantially in equal number of times at the top, bottom, and in each intermediate place of the list or group of parties in which they belong.

Stipulates that if the Governor is not present in the state, the Lieutenant Governor shall pose as a substitute and permits the Governor to designate that person, with approval from the presiding officer of the body to be attended, to appear for them. Presents the legislative intent that the Arizona legislature would like to emulate question and answer sessions that occur in the United Kingdom between Parliament and the Prime Minister.

A person who is otherwise qualified to register to vote may register on election day by appearing at the polling place, completing a registration form, and providing proof of residence. A person registering in this manner may vote using a provisional ballot per state law. Registration under these circumstances does not qualify a person to vote in a partisan primary election.

HB2096 - Permanent early voting list

Sponsor

Rep. Seth Blattman (D)

Summary

Replaces "Active" early voter list with "Permanent" Early Voter list. Except in a special taxing district that is authorized to conduct its own election and a special district mail ballot election, a voter is no longer removed automatically from being sent an early ballot if the voter fails to vote an early ballot in all "elections" (formerly defined) for two consecutive election cycles. Removes several exceptions to removing a voter from the permanent early voter list. Removes the definition of "election cycle" for this section.

HB2097 - Voting rights; restoration

Sponsor

Rep. Seth Blattman (D)

Summary

A person's right to vote is automatically restored on the person's completion of probation or the receipt of an absolute discharge from imprisonment.

HB2129 - Write-in candidates; filings; ballots

Sponsor

Rep. Selina Bliss (R)

Summary

Changes the deadline for a write-in candidate to file nomination paperwork to the 70th day before an election. Modifies the ballot format to accommodate as many blank lines as there are qualified write-in candidates, plus one additional blank line for each office, up to the total number of offices to be filled. Requires that there be one blank line for write-in candidates if no write-in candidates have qualified for an office and that each blank line will have a space for an elector to put a mark.

Requires the affected financial institutions to provide requested information from the Auditor General, or their official representative, in a thorough and timely manner. Requires an authorized representative of the financial institution or enterprise to certify all information provided. Stipulates that the cost of complying with an Auditor

General's request is to be covered by the state agency, board, Commission, department, institution, program, Advisory Council, or committee or political subdivision the Auditor General is reviewing. Stipulates that a financial institution or enterprise is not liable to the entity whose information it is turning over to the Auditor General, pursuant to state law.

HB2376 - County candidates; clean elections pamphlet

Stipulates that this legislation is effective only on the affirmative vote of at least three-fourths of the members of each House of the legislature.

Adds that in a county of less than one million people, for the position of Justice of the Peace, a candidate qualifies if they produce 300 signatures from a precinct.

Removes the following requirements that delineate that the county recorder or election officer must post a public list of any sites designated as emergency polling places—along with the reasons for that designation and attempts made to secure alternatives—at least two weeks before election day, and that if a site is not on the emergency-designation list, the facility must allow political activity outside the seventy-five-foot zone, and that should an emergency arise after the initial posting, the county recorder or election officer is required to update the list promptly with the relevant details.

Requires any “person” (defined) or vendor that provides services to an Arizona government entity to provide a dated and sworn statement, under penalty of perjury, that they are not knowingly the recipient, directly or indirectly, of donations from a foreign source. This certification is to be updated annually and the person signing the statement shall update and amend their certification upon learning any new information pertaining to the above prohibitions. Lists the reports and records that must be submitted by government entities pertaining to verifying that no foreign influences have provided donations, directly or indirectly, from the individuals or vendors those agencies maintain a relationship with. Prescribes specific penalties for an individual for vendor who provides false information to the Arizona Secretary of State. Stipulates that for this legislation federally recognized sovereign tribal nations are not considered to be foreign governments. Prohibits any foreign government from aiding an individual or organization to help influence the outcome of an election or ballot measure. Requires any person, entity, or committee that is required to file campaign finance reports pursuant to state law, to certify under penalty of perjury in those reports that the person, entity or committee has not accepted or used monies or in-kind goods or services in violation of this legislation.

HB2623 - Campaign finance; candidate committee transfers

Sponsor

Rep. Jeff Weninger (R)

Summary

Permits a candidate committee for a city or town candidate to transfer contributions to that same candidate's statewide or legislative campaign, provided the aggregate amount of contributions from any individual that are transferred do not exceed the legal contribution limitations of the office for which the candidate is running. Requires that any ordinance, rule, resolution or regulation a county, city or town adopts that mandates a candidate's financial disclosure also require the candidate or campaign disclosure also be accessible to the public on the county, city or town website.

HB2630 - Governor nominations; agency position; eligibility

Modifies a reference to "his" to "the incumbent's." Stipulates that if the Senate rejects the nomination of a director made by the Governor pursuant to this legislation, the nominee is not eligible for any position within the same state agency for which the nominee was nominated.

HB2632 - Regulatory costs; rulemaking; legislative ratification

Requires an Arizona agency to submit to the Arizona Office of Economic Opportunity (AOEO) any proposed "rule" (defined) that is projected to increase regulatory costs in Arizona by more than \$100,000 within five years of implementation. Prohibits a submitted proposed rule from becoming effective unless approved by the legislature, if the AOEO, finds that the rule will likely cost more than \$500,000 within five years after implementation. Requires the AOEO to submit the proposed rule to the Administrative Rules Oversight Committee (Committee) no later than 30 days before the next regular legislative session and requires the Committee to submit the proposed rule to the legislature as soon as practicable. Permits any member of the legislature to submit legislation to ratify the proposed rule and exempts it from any statutes regarding the time and manner of rulemaking. Prohibits an agency from filing the final rule with the Arizona Secretary of State without legislative approval and stipulates that if the legislature does not ratify the proposed rule during the current

legislative session, the agency shall terminate the proposed rule by publishing a notice of termination in the register. Allows a person that is regulated by an agency that is proposing a rule, to request the AOEO review the proposed rule, and the legislature to be able to request the AOEO to review any proposed rule. Stipulates that this legislation does not apply to emergency rules, or the Arizona Corporation Commission. Provides for severability.

Vote recording and vote tabulating machines and devices that were acquired before January 1, 2029 would have been exempt.

For every complaint that is filed pursuant to this legislation related to campaign finance, that is not resolved, extended or ruled on within 180 days after the complaint is filed, the complaint is deemed dismissed.

HB2673 - Early ballots; deadlines; foreign money

Prohibits any Arizona government entity from using monies or in-kind goods or services that are donated, directly or indirectly, by a foreign government, or any "foreign nongovernmental source" (defined) for election administration. Requires any "person" (defined) or vendor that provides services to an Arizona government entity to provide a dated and sworn statement, under penalty of perjury, that they are not knowingly the recipient, directly or indirectly, of donations from a foreign source.

Prescribes specific penalties for an individual for vendor who provides false information to the Arizona Secretary of State. Permits a qualified elector to bring an action pertaining to specific, listed law and violations and outlines what they are entitled to if they prevail. Requires a unique early voter ID number to be issued to each voter on the early voter list and stipulates that the early voter record does not constitute a public record and enjoys protections of personally identifying information. Defines the process for verifying early voter identifications and the process for handling voters whose identity or address cannot be identified. Permits a voter to remain on the early voter list if they confirm their address once every election cycle by telephone, in writing, or online, and they provide at least 2 methods of confirmation. Outlines the process and requirements for a mailed ballot to be counted, and the process by which submitted ballots shall be handled prior to, on, and after Election Day.

HB2703 - Early voting; tabulation; ballot deadlines

Sponsor

Summary

Strikes the ability of a county Board of Supervisors to authorize by specific resolution the County Recorder or other election official to use emergency voting centers, and the ability of a principal of a school to deny a request to provide space for polling stations. Shifts the deadline for an early voter to cast a vote at an early voting location from Friday before an election to the Monday before an election. Strikes the ability of a qualified elector to request an emergency voting accommodation and a County Recorder or election official to grant an emergency accommodation. Outlines instructions that must be given to early voters up to 2026, and from 2026 forward. Defines ways an early voter can deliver their ballot to the County Recorder or Officer in Charge of elections, including identification requirements, locations and methods of delivery. Strikes the requirement of a County Recorder or election official to count and report early voting totals. Exempts early voters who show up in person from having their mail affidavit verified. Eliminates the ability of an elector that does not present identification to put their ballot in a drop box.

HB2705 - Nomination petitions; counties; strict compliance

Permits signatures from multiple counties in a specific district, if the office they are running for spans multiple counties. Requires a nominee for elected public office to comply with all statutory requirements for seeking office.

HB2722 - Public resources; expenditures; prohibition

Summary

Requires that all use of public monies by a “public entity” (defined) must benefit the public by intent and be for a “public purpose” (defined), is supported by “consideration” (defined), and the public entity must retain continuing control over the funds. Allows the Arizona Attorney General or a taxpayer in Arizona to file an action in a court of general jurisdiction to challenge an expenditure, loan or use of “public resources” (defined). Outlines how a plaintiff in that situation would prevail in court. Entitles this legislation the “Taxpayers Protection Act.” Modifies the chapter heading of Title 1, Chapter 5, ARS, from “Public Programs” to “Public Resources”.

HB2735 - Ballot receptacles; electioneering limits

Summary

Requires the Board of Supervisors to provide for each 75-foot zone for a designated ballot receptacle three notices expressing the 75-foot limit. Prohibits interfering with a voter, or electioneering, within the 75-foot limit for a designated ballot receptacle.

HB2767 - Voter registrations; transportation department; recorders

Summary

Requires the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) to transmit simultaneously and directly any voter registration information received pursuant to state law, to the Arizona Secretary of State, and other listed, appropriate parties. Effective January 1, 2026. Provides for severability.

HB2794 - Polling places; accessible equipment

Requires that any accessible device place at a precinct-based polling place or voting center be programmed and prepared so that all ballot styles for that jurisdiction or county are available from each device without regard to precinct or other locations in which the device is used.

HB2796 - Politically engaged persons; criminal charges

Rep. Alexander Kolodin (R)

Summary

Requires that criminal charges against a “politically engaged person” (defined) be pre-approved by a majority of the Attorney General and all county attorneys using standard prosecutorial criteria. Requires, if the approval of all required parties is not given, a court to dismiss charges unless prosecutors prove they were unaware of the defendant’s political status. Extends to prosecutors three months to refile charges after securing approval. Requires a motion to dismiss to be filed within 30 days of the charges.

HB2804 - Sample ballots; mailing date

Summary

Requires a county Board of Supervisors print mailers of sample ballots 14 days before a primary or general election.

HB2844 - Multiple nonpartisan candidates; primary

Sponsor

Rep. Lupe Diaz (R)

Summary

Defines how nonpartisan candidates may appear on the ballot. Covers how to handle multiple nonpartisan candidates in an election and their assigned position on a nonpartisan ballot for consideration in the primary election. Stipulates that for the nonpartisan ballot, the candidate who receives the most votes advances to the general election as the nonpartisan nominee for that office. Addresses placement of nonpartisan candidates on the general election ballot. Requires the Legislative Council to prepare proposed legislation conforming the ARS to the provisions of this legislation, if needed.

HB2927 - Public meetings; records; requirements; penalties

Summary

Requires a public body that meets regularly to once a month, at least, make an open call to the public and stipulates that the open call must occur in the first 30 minutes of a public meeting and stay open for at least 30 minutes once commenced, unless each person who indicated a desire to speak has spoken within that 30 minutes window. Covers public notice for executive sessions unless the public body complies with other notice requirements required by this legislation. Requires public access if a public meeting occurs via technical devices via technical devices and a physical location where the public may view the meeting. Requires the Arizona Attorney General or applicable County Attorney to investigate and respond to written complaints pertaining to public meetings and public access within 120 days after receipt of the complaint. Requires electronic copies of records to be provided on request and limits charges to just the cost of materials. Requires the court to review de novo any question of law related to this legislation. Lists information that must be included in any request for information and penalties for willfully and intentionally refusing to honor part of this legislation.

Asks voters to approve the issuance have a unique early voter ID number to each voter on the early voting list, defines the information that must be on an early voter ballot request, as well as rules to require a county recorder or other election officer to reject a voter's early ballot application if all required information is not submitted, and the process and wording that must be included on the issuance of early voting materials. Asks voters to approve the process and evaluator must follow to verify the information submitted by an early voter.

Summary

The 2024 general election ballot is to carry the question of whether to amend the Arizona Revised Statutes related to rule making that would require an Arizona agency to submit to the Arizona Office of Economic Opportunity (AOEO) any proposed “rule” (defined) that is projected to increase regulatory costs in Arizona by more than \$100,000 within five years of implementation. The measure would prohibit a submitted proposed rule from becoming effective unless approved by the legislature if the AOEO finds that the rule will likely cost more than \$500,000 within five years after implementation. Sets a deadline for submitting the rule for review to the Administrative Rules Oversight Committee (Committee) and requires the Committee to submit the proposed rule to the legislature as soon as practicable. Permits any member of the legislature to submit legislation to ratify the proposed rule and exempts it from any statutes regarding the time and manner of rulemaking. Prohibits an agency from filing the final rule with the Arizona Secretary of State without legislative approval and stipulates that if the legislature does not ratify the proposed rule during the current legislative session, the agency shall terminate the proposed rule by publishing a notice of termination in the register. Allows a person that is regulated by an agency that is proposing a rule, to request the AOEO review the proposed rule, and the legislature to be able to request the AOEO to review any proposed rule. Stipulates that this legislation does not apply to emergency rules, or the Arizona Corporation Commission. Provides for severability.

SB1001 - Early ballots; identification; tabulation

Summary

Prohibits a County Recorder or other Officer in Charge of Elections from operating an on-site early voting location after 7:00 P.M. on the Friday preceding an election if the official in question is not able to revise precinct registrations and other election materials for use on election day to help identify which voters have requested and early ballot, voted, or are on the inactive voter list. Revises the effective date of this legislation to be upon enactment and defines early voting procedures, including voter identification, roll signature, ballot mailing, delivery, ballot handling, processing, and security requirements, and timeframes for accepting early ballots.

Mandates that any early voting locations be open and available for use on the Saturday and Monday before an election, and details the requirements for an early voting elector to vote up until 7 p.m. the Monday before an election. Requires voters showing up at an early voting location to be given a ballot upon verification of their identification and provides wording for the early voting certification form and procedures for processing that elector and his or her ballot.

Stipulates a municipality's or county's ability to do such, provided the two-thirds vote authorizes the imposition or increase in any assessment, tax or fee, is not subject to further regulation by the applicable municipality or county.

Requirements for the agreement are listed. Effective January 1, 2026.

Stipulates that any nomination petition signatures that are collected before the Statement of Interest and the recall application are filed are invalid and subject to challenge.

Requires the Arizona Secretary of State verify vote recording and tabulating machines approved for use pursuant to state law, have the appropriate level security, per industry best practices, not have hardware installed that supports any form of remote access, or software that allows any change to results in files or database, support the usage and tracking of users based on unique credentials that are changed at least once per election cycle, log deletions of ballot information, and maintain election data for 22 months after the election. Prohibits voting equipment used in a polling place or voting center from having Internet access and access by any means to any data or results, and if the equipment has an accessible port, the port must be locked with tamper proof sealing and logged in a chain of custody document when broken or accessed. Requires the same security, logging and management for tabulation equipment and permits only authorized personnel, including political party observers, to be present at the tabulation of votes. Requires two observers who are not members of the same political party be present when a removable storage device is employed, including during the insertion, removal, and transportation of the device. Requires activities at the counting center be included in a nonstop video, pursuant to state law, that is posted to the county's website. Stipulates that a person who violates this legislation is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Requires a state, county, city, town or school district office to provide sufficient space for use as a polling place upon request of the Officer in charge of elections for any state, county, city or town elections and exempts district schools with a "gymnasium" (defined) from any state, local or school district requirements that would otherwise prevent or limit the use of the school or its gymnasium as a polling place. Removes the ability of the principal of a district or charter school to deny a request to provide space for use as a polling place for an election by providing a written statement indicating that space is not available at the school; or the safety or welfare of the children would be jeopardized.

Knowing violations are a class 5 (second-lowest) felony.

The boards of supervisors of Hohokam, Mogollon, and O'odham Counties will be elected at a special election held within 120 days after the effective date of this legislation. Currently elected Maricopa County Supervisors continue in their capacity for the remainder of their term in whichever county their supervisory district is located. The elected boards of supervisors in the three new counties will determine an application process for municipalities to apply to be the county seat, which will be determined at a special election to be held within 120 days from the election of the boards of supervisors. The four counties are authorized to enter into a ten-year shared use agreement for the use of existing shared capital assets. The four counties are required to enter into an intergovernmental agreement for the continued operation of community colleges for at least ten years after the effective date of this legislation. Effective January 1, 2026.

penalty of perjury that no prohibited form of contribution has been accepted by the person, entity or committee. Exempts federally recognized sovereign tribal nations.

The language in the proposed amendment outlines how the census is to work and creates the State Census Fund for the purposes of taking the census required by this amendment modification. Stipulates that state legislative districts must have equal citizenship population apportionment. Grants any member of the legislature standing to initiate an action or proceedings to enforce this change. **Takes \$5,000,000 from the Clean Elections Fund yearly and places it in the Census Fund.**

The Executive Director hereby provides the following Statement of Reasons why there may be reason to believe that a violation of the Citizens Clean Elections Act and Commission rules (collectively, the “Act”) may have occurred.

Summary of Recommendation

Anna Abeytia (“Respondent”) chose to become a participating candidate for the 2024 election cycle and the Clean Elections Fund provided her \$53,933. Because she has not filed timely campaign finance reports required by the Act and Rules and because she has failed to respond to multiple efforts from Clean Elections staff and auditors to find evidence to account for her use of funds, there is reason to believe she has violated multiple provisions of the Clean Elections Act and Rules.

I. Factual Background

Respondent applied for certification as a participating candidate on June 14, 2024. Exhibit 1. Respondent provided sufficient qualifying contributions to meet the statutory requirements for clean elections funding on July 9, 2024. Exhibit 2. Respondent reallocated a portion of clean elections funding to the primary election period pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-952. *Id.* Consequently, Respondent received \$31,760 in clean elections funding for the primary. *Id.* Respondent won nomination to the

legislative district 24 general election. General election funding of \$21,173 was approved on July 31, 2024. Exhibit 3.

Respondent did not file any periodic campaign finance reports after her primary recap report on September 4, 2024, Exhibit 4, until April 21, 2025. Consequently, Respondent did not file any campaign finance report for her 2024 committee after accepting her general election funding until April 21, 2025.

Respondent ignored efforts to contact her made by Clean Elections designated auditors and Clean Elections staff members. Exhibit 5 at 3. Following initial notice from staff, the auditors reported:

We reached out to Anna Abeytia (the Candidate) via email on November 25, 2024, and again on December 4, 2024; neither of which received a response. On December 12, 2024, we called the number listed on the Candidate's campaign finance report and left a message, again not receiving any type of response. We called again on January 28, 2025, and spoke to Anna Abeytia, and she said she would send over the requested documentation that evening. That was the last time we heard from her. It should also be noted that as of February 17, 2025, the Candidate has not filed their 2024 Primary Recap Report, 2024 Pre-General Election, or 2024 General Recap Report with the Arizona Secretary of State, and as such, does not show up on the See The Money website (<https://seethemoney.az.gov/>). Therefore, we are unable to review any of the expenses, contributions, or perform any other procedure as required for our testing of the Candidate's Clean Elections funding.

Id.

The Executive Director issued a Complaint against Respondent on March 10, 2025 along with a copy of the audit report. Exhibit 6. Respondent did not respond or acknowledge the Complaint.

Commission staff heard from Respondent via email on April 16 after contacting her about a discrepancy in her existing reports. Respondent wrote that: ““I have hired a fiancé [sic] advisor to help get the reporting done and fix some stuff from the primary. There are was no money left over from the money but my reports weren’t reflecting that so they are looking to figure that out. As for the General funding I do have about \$1,900 or so left over and they working on getting the reporting done to reflect that.” Exhibit 7.

Respondent finally filed remaining reports on April 21, but the reports generally show the same kind of lump sum payment to a consulting firm, Gumption Consulting. See Table 2 and Exhibit 8.

II. Alleged Violations

A. Failure to file campaign finance reports.

Candidates are required to file campaign finance reports “that include all receipts and disbursements for their current campaign account.” Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-110(A). “In addition to any other penalties imposed by law, the civil penalty for a violation by . . . any candidate of any reporting requirement imposed by [Chapter 6 of Title 16] shall be [\$210] per day for candidates for the legislature” up to a statutory maximum limit based on the amount of money not reported. A.R.S. § 16-942(B).

As Table 1 demonstrates, Respondent filed two reports late in 2024 and had failed to file a report for her Clean Elections committee since.

Table 2 demonstrates that after the Reason to Believe memo was sent to Respondent, she filed reports that were outstanding.

B. Recordkeeping and return of monies

The Clean Elections Act and Rules provide for various rules to prevent the misuse of monies from the Clean Elections Fund. Most of these rules are common sense, that is, the kind of things any ordinary campaign or small business project would consider.

In addition to the reporting requirements described above, candidates are required to maintain books and records. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-115(A)-(B). Audits are intended to ensure that these steps are taken. Additionally, reports and accounting requirements help verify that you have properly returned monies as required by A.R.S. § 16-953 (relating to return of monies).

Based on Respondent's decision to avoid the auditors and her admission last week that she needs to seek a professional service to assist her in addressing her reports, and her related admission she has not returned monies to the fund, there is reason to believe that a violation of Arizona Administrative Code section R2-20-115 has occurred and a violation of A.R.S. § 16-953 has occurred.

The mere fact that she has now filed additional reports that largely show large disbursements to a single consulting firm are not sufficient to satisfy Respondent's burden, while the late filings after the course of action Respondent has undertaken supports the inference the reports are not in order.

III. Repayment Order

The facts described above additionally support the Commission voting to approve the repayment order Staff has proposed. Respondent's failure to file reports at all, in many cases, or reports that she has not substantiated by her own admission, along with her refusal to respond to required audits to which she agreed support the conclusion that an order of repayment should be approved. Respondent has not met the burden she agreed to by choosing to participate. Specifically, as detailed in the proposed order, respondent has not met her burden regarding her use of clean elections funding the Commission orders repayment of the entire amount of \$53,933 on the following two independent grounds:

a. Use of funds not for direct campaign expenses. Respondent had the burden of proving expenditures were for direct campaign purposes. Respondent has not met her burden to show that expenses with primary election funding were for direct campaign purposes or that the General Election funds were used for direct campaign expenses. Therefore, the Commission concludes that the funds were not used for direct campaign expenses and determines that the full amount of \$53,933 must be returned. Ariz. Admin. Code § R2-20-704(B)(2).

b. Expenditures were not documented in accordance with campaign finance reporting requirements. Respondent has not provided sufficient documentation of expenditures in the primary election or general election. Therefore, the

Commission determines the full amount of \$53,933 must be returned. Ariz. Admin. Code § R2-20-704(B)(3).

Recommendation

If the Commission determines there is a reason to believe that a violation of a statute or rule over which the Commission has jurisdiction may have occurred, an investigation shall be conducted. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-209(A). If the Commission determines there is reason to believe, the Executive Director shall, in the Executive Director's discretion, subpoena Respondent's records documenting disbursements, debts, or obligations to the present, and may authorize an audit.

Upon expiration of fourteen (14) days, if the Commission finds that the alleged violator remains out of compliance, the Commission shall make a public finding to that effect and issue an order assessing a civil penalty in accordance with A.R.S. § 16-942, unless the Commission publishes findings of fact and conclusions of law expressing good cause for reducing or excusing the penalty. A.R.S. § 16-957(B).

After fourteen (14) days and upon completion of the investigation, the Executive Director will recommend whether the Commission should find probable cause to believe that a violation of a statute or rule over which the Commission has jurisdiction has occurred. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-214(A). Upon a finding of probable cause that the alleged violator remains out of compliance, by an affirmative vote of at least three (3) of its members, the Commission may issue an

order and assess civil penalties pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-957(B). Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-217.

The Executive Director also recommends the Commission approve the Repayment Order.

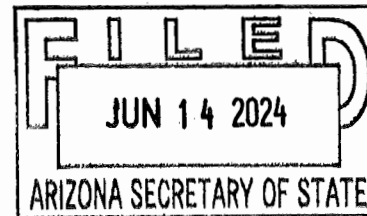

Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

Summary of Procedures and Findings

1. Preliminary Procedures

Finding

It should also be noted that as of February 17, 2025, the Candidate has not filed their 2024 Primary Recap Report, 2024 Pre-General Election, or 2024 General Recap Report with the Arizona Secretary of State, and as such, does not show up on the See The Money website (<https://seethemoney.az.gov/>). Therefore, we are unable to review any of the expenses, contributions, or perform any other procedure as required for our testing of the Candidate's Clean Elections funding.

- b). Perform a desk review of the disbursements reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports to identify any unusual items requiring follow-up during fieldwork.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- d). Contact the candidate or the campaign treasurer, as appropriate, to schedule a date to perform fieldwork. Discuss the nature of the documentation, which will be needed to perform the engagement and ascertain the location of the necessary documentation.

Finding

We attempted to contact the Candidate to discuss the agreed-upon procedures, the timing of our procedures, and the documentation needed as described in step 1.a)., but we were unable to communicate with the Candidate.

2. Fieldwork Procedures

- a) Contractor will contact the candidate to request the records for an agreed-upon procedures attest engagement. Candidates receiving audits after the Primary Election shall provide records from the election cycle through the 2024 Qualifying Period Recap Report. Candidates receiving audits after the General Election shall provide records from the election cycle through the 2024 General Recap Report.

Finding

Commission staff sent an initial notice to the Candidate and informed the Candidate that we would be contacting them. We then communicated to the Candidate in a written request, the purpose of the request, agreed-upon procedures to be performed, documentation needed, and potential future requirements of the Candidate.

- b) The contractor shall contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the purpose of the engagement, the general procedures to be performed and potential future requirements of the candidate, such as possible repayments to the Fund.

Finding

See comment in a) above.

- c) The Contractor shall contact or conduct an interview with the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (i) Review bank statements from July 2024 through November 2024 (the reporting period) and perform the following:

- Select five (5) samples of deposits and withdrawals from the bank statements and determine that the transaction is properly reflected in the candidate's records and campaign finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- Perform a proof of receipts and disbursements for the reporting period, which is defined as reporting the ending balances of the November 2024 bank statement and the 2024 General Recap Report.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- d) Using the dates and limits defined in the Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Guide, review the receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports to determine the following:

- (i) The candidate accepted contributions only from individuals.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) None of the contributions received from individuals exceed the early contribution limit.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iii) Check compliance with the maximum early contribution limits.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iv) Check compliance with the maximum personal contribution limits.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- e) For both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) contributions reported in the candidate's campaign finance report (not including the \$5 qualifying contributions) and agree to supporting documentation, which reflects the name of the contributor (for all contributions) and for individuals who contributed greater than \$100, which reflects the contributor's address, occupation and employer.

Finding

No contributions were reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance reports during the reporting period.

- (i) For other types of cash receipts reported on the candidate's campaign finance reports, review supporting documentation and review for compliance with regulatory rules and laws and agree the receipt to inclusion in the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) For in-kind contributions, review the supporting documentation and determine the methodology utilized to value the contribution and assess the reasonableness.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- f) For both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) of cash expenditures reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports and perform the following:

- (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- Agree the amount of the expenditure to the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- g) Determine whether any petty cash funds have been established and, if so, determine how expenditures from these funds have been reflected in the accounting records. Determine whether aggregate petty cash funds exceed the limit of \$1,800.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (i) If applicable, for both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) candidate's petty cash fund expenditures and obtain supporting documentation for the expenditure. Determine whether the expenditure was for a direct campaign expense and whether the expenditure was in excess of the \$210 limit on petty cash expenditures.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- h) Determine if the candidate/campaign incurred any debt. If so, report all debt.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- i) Contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the preliminary engagement findings and recommendations that the Contractor anticipates presenting to the CCEC. During this conference, the Contractor will advise the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) of their right to respond to the preliminary findings and the projected timetable for the issuance of the final issuance of the report.

Finding

We reported our findings to the Candidate and the Candidate did not provide responses to our findings.

This letter represents notice of a complaint against you by the Executive Director of the Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission and well as to provide you a copy of a preliminary audit report. You have an opportunity to respond to both as discussed below.

According the Arizona Campaign Finance Reporting System, you stopped filing periodic reports after the late filing of your Primary Recap and Qualifying Period Recap Reports on September 9, 2024. *See* Table 1. Additionally, you have refused to participate in required auditing under the Citizens Clean Elections Act and Rules, as reflected in the attached report. *See* Exhibit 1.

The Clean Elections Act and Rules require participating candidates to file periodic reports of their campaign financial activities, conduct all activities through a single campaign account, ensure that funds are expended in accordance with the Act and Rules, and permit an audit to confirm compliance with those requirements.

Your failure to file campaign finance reports and failure to respond to a required audit logically support the conclusion you have acted knowingly in failing to meet these obligations. Indeed, the available records indicate your campaign ceased to provide any required financial information despite its legal obligations and the application for certification that you signed and filed. *See* Exhibit 2.

Campaign finance reports and audits are the primary mechanism by which Clean Elections ensures that you are abiding by the terms of the Act to which you have agreed.

The absence of proper reporting and ignoring the audit raises concerns that other important restrictions you agreed to as a participating candidate may not have been abided by.

Consequently, you and your campaign may be in violation of A.R.S. §§ 16-941(A)(1) (limiting contributions), -941(A)(2) (limiting personal expenditures), -941(A)(3)(primary spending limit), -941(A)(4) (general spending limit), -941(A)(5)(campaign accounts and return of monies) and -948 (campaign accounts).

Failure to file reports can lead to penalties under A.R.S. § 16-942 (including daily penalties of \$210 per day for violations for failure to follow reporting requirements).

Additionally, reports help verify that you have properly returned monies as required by A.R.S. § 16-953 (relating to return of monies). The absence of the reports supports an inquiry into what monies ought to have been returned.

Absent reports, we also consider that you may have violated Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-110 (participating candidates reporting requirements) and Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-115 (books and recordkeeping requirements) and have failed to establish that you have fulfilled your obligation to show compliance with Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-702 (use of funds), Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-702.01 (use of assets), Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-703 (documentation of expenditures), Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-703.01 (consultants). Again, in each of these instances,

absent reports and compliance with the audit requirements, we must consider these possible violations.

This is a serious matter. Violations of the above requirements can trigger penalties under A.R.S. §§ 16-942, -943, and -957, as well as Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-222. Candidates can also be subjected to repayment under Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-704. Additionally, “if the candidate fails to provide adequate office space, personnel or records, the Commission may seek judicial intervention to enforce the request or assess other penalties.” Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-403(C).

The Commission’s rules provide that you “be afforded an opportunity to demonstrate that no action should be taken on the basis of a complaint by submitting, *within five days from receipt of a written copy of the complaint*, a letter or memorandum setting forth reasons why the Commission should take no action.” Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-205(A). Please respond to this notice and complaint by the close of business on March 18, 2025.

Additionally, if you have any response to the enclosed audit report you have 10 days to provide that response. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-404(B).

Your response must be notarized, or it will not be considered. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-205(C). Failure to respond to this complaint within five days may be viewed as an admission to the allegations. *Id.*

The rule states that we are to provide you with an advisement of Commission compliance procedures. Those procedures are set forth in Article 2 of the Commission’s Rules (Arizona Administrative Code Sections R2-20-201 to R2-20-228). *See* Exhibit 3.

Code §§ R2-20-702, R2-20-703 and R2-20-704 (providing for the repayment of funds), the Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the “Commission”), hereby orders Anna Abeytia (“Respondent”), a participating candidate for Legislature in 2024, to repay the amount of \$31,760. This order is effective upon approval of the Commission and is based on the following legal and factual reasons:

- A. Respondent applied for certification as a participating candidate on June 14, 2024. Exhibit 1.
- B. Respondent provided sufficient qualifying contributions to meet the statutory requirements for clean elections funding on July 9, 2024. Exhibit 2.
- C. Respondent reallocated a portion of clean elections funding to the primary election period pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-952. Exhibit 3. Consequently, Respondent received \$31,760 in clean elections funding for the primary. *Id.*

- 1 D. Respondent won nomination to the legislative district 24 general election.
- 2 E. General election funding of \$21,173 was approved on July 31, 2024. Exhibit 4.
- 3 F. Respondent ~~did not file ceased filing any~~ periodic campaign finance reports after her
4 primary recap report on September 4, 2024. Exhibit 5. ~~until April 21, 2025.~~
5 Consequently, Respondent ~~did not filehas not filed any~~ campaign finance report for her
6 2024 committee ~~after accepting since she accepted~~ her general election funding ~~until~~
7 ~~April 21, 2025.~~
- 8 G. Respondent bears the burden of showing that expenditures of clean elections funding
9 are for direct campaign purposes. Ariz. Admin. Code §§ R2-20-702, R2-20-703.
- 10 H. Respondent agreed to these conditions in her application for certification. Exhibit 1.
- 11 I. Respondent ignored efforts to contact her made by Clean Elections designated
12 auditors and Clean Elections staff members. Exhibit 6 at 3.
- 13 Specifically, the auditors reported:
- 14 We reached out to Anna Abeytia (the Candidate) via email on
15 November 25, 2024, and again on December 4, 2024; neither of

K. On April 16, 2025 Clean Elections staff contacted Respondent about reconciling her existing reports which show an amount of clean elections funding eligible to return.

L. In her reply Respondent indicated that "I have hired a fiance [sic] advisor to help get the reporting done and fix some stuff from the primary. There are was no money left over from the money but my reports weren't reflecting that so they are looking to figure that out. As for the General funding I do have about \$1,900 or so left over and they working on getting the reporting done to reflect that." Exhibit 7.

M. Regarding the use of funds through the primary, Respondent has reported disbursing \$32,400.00 to a single consulting firm known as Gumption Consulting LLC for "Professional services- Consultants." Respondent has provided no additional information about whether that expenditure was for direct campaign expenses.

N. This is slightly more than the \$31,760 the Clean Elections Fund provided Respondent.

O. Together with her admission in Exhibit 7, and the failure to respond to audit inquiries, Respondent has not met her burden of showing that the \$31,760 provided by the Clean Elections Fund was used for direct campaign expenses.

P. On April 21, 2025, Respondent filed several reports that purport to represent where the \$21,173 Respondent received for the General Election from the Clean Elections fund, was disbursed. Again the largest single recipient is the Gumption Consulting LLC entity.

1 Q. These reports were filed after Respondent was notified of this proposed order and staff
2 recommendations and after she had informed staff that she needed a financial aide to
3 complete her reports.

4 R. Respondent has not met her burden because she has failed to provide ~~to~~
5 documentation, admitted that her existing campaign finance reports are inaccurate and
6 incomplete, failed to provide required reports and failed to respond to staff and auditor's
7 requests for information.

8 S. Because Respondent has not met her burden regarding her use of clean elections
9 funding the Commission orders repayment of the entire amount of \$53,933 on the
10 following two independent grounds:

11 a. Use of funds not for direct campaign expenses. Respondent had the burden of

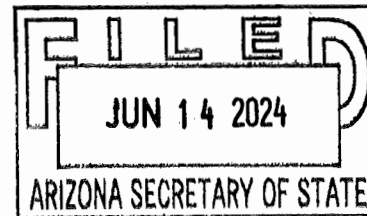

9. I will keep and furnish to the Commission all documentation relating to expenditures, receipts, funding, books, records (including bank records for all accounts), and supporting documentation and other information that the Commission may request in accordance with Commission rules.
10. I will permit an audit and examination of all receipts and expenditures including those made by the candidate, the candidate's authorized committee, or any agent or person authorized to make expenditures on behalf of the candidate or committee. The candidate and the candidate's authorized committee shall also provide any material required in connection with an audit, investigation, or examination conducted by the Commission. The candidate and authorized committee shall facilitate the audit and examination and shall pay any amounts required to be repaid.
11. I will submit the name and mailing address of the person who is entitled to receive equalizing fund payments on behalf of the candidate and the name and address of the campaign depository designated by the candidate. Changes in the information required by this paragraph shall not be effective until submitted to the Commission in a letter signed by the candidate or the committee treasurer.
12. I will pay any civil penalties included in a conciliation agreement or otherwise imposed against the candidate.
13. I will file all campaign finance reports with the Secretary of State in an electronic format in a timely manner.

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were specified and agreed to by the State of Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the Commission), solely to assist the Commission in evaluating whether Anna Abeytia's (the Candidate)'s 2024 Post-Primary Election (Q3), 2024 Pre-General Election, and 2024 General Recap Report (the Reports) which covers the period from July 14, 2024 through November 5, 2024 (the reporting period) was prepared in compliance with Title 16, Articles 1 and 2 of the Arizona Revised Statutes, Campaign Contributions and Expenses, and the Citizens Clean Elections Act, and whether the reports complied with the rules of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. The Candidate's management is responsible for the Campaign finance reports during the reporting period. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and associated findings are presented on the subsequent pages.

We were engaged by the Commission to perform this agreed-upon procedures engagement and conducted our engagement in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We were not engaged to, and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Campaign finance reports during the reporting period of Anna Abeytia. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

We are required to be independent of the Commission and the Candidate and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our agreed-upon procedures engagement.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the parties listed in the first paragraph, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

Summary of Procedures and Findings

1. Preliminary Procedures

- a) Contractor will obtain a copy of the candidate's campaign finance reports for the reporting period.

Finding

We reached out to Anna Abeytia (the Candidate) via email on November 25, 2024, and again on December 4, 2024; neither of which received a response. On December 12, 2024, we called the number listed on the Candidate's campaign finance report and left a message, again not receiving any type of response. We called again on January 28, 2025, and spoke to Anna Abeytia, and she said she would send over the requested documentation that evening. That was the last time we heard from her. It should also be noted that as of February 17, 2025, the Candidate has not filed their 2024 Primary Recap Report, 2024 Pre-General Election, or 2024 General Recap Report with the Arizona Secretary of State, and as such, does not show up on the See The Money website (<https://seethemoney.az.gov/>). Therefore, we are unable to review any of the expenses, contributions, or perform any other procedure as required for our testing of the Candidate's Clean Elections funding.

- b). Perform a desk review of the disbursements reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports to identify any unusual items requiring follow-up during fieldwork.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- d). Contact the candidate or the campaign treasurer, as appropriate, to schedule a date to perform fieldwork. Discuss the nature of the documentation, which will be needed to perform the engagement and ascertain the location of the necessary documentation.

Finding

We attempted to contact the Candidate to discuss the agreed-upon procedures, the timing of our procedures, and the documentation needed as described in step 1.a)., but we were unable to communicate with the Candidate.

2. Fieldwork Procedures

- a) Contractor will contact the candidate to request the records for an agreed-upon procedures attest engagement. Candidates receiving audits after the Primary Election shall provide records from the election cycle through the 2024 Qualifying Period Recap Report. Candidates receiving audits after the General Election shall provide records from the election cycle through the 2024 General Recap Report.

Finding

Commission staff sent an initial notice to the Candidate and informed the Candidate that we would be contacting them. We then communicated to the Candidate in a written request, the purpose of the request, agreed-upon procedures to be performed, documentation needed, and potential future requirements of the Candidate.

- b) The contractor shall contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the purpose of the engagement, the general procedures to be performed and potential future requirements of the candidate, such as possible repayments to the Fund.

Finding

See comment in a) above.

- c) The Contractor shall contact or conduct an interview with the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (i) Review bank statements from July 2024 through November 2024 (the reporting period) and perform the following:

- Select five (5) samples of deposits and withdrawals from the bank statements and determine that the transaction is properly reflected in the candidate's records and campaign finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- Perform a proof of receipts and disbursements for the reporting period, which is defined as reporting the ending balances of the November 2024 bank statement and the 2024 General Recap Report.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- d) Using the dates and limits defined in the Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Guide, review the receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports to determine the following:

- (i) The candidate accepted contributions only from individuals.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) None of the contributions received from individuals exceed the early contribution limit.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iii) Check compliance with the maximum early contribution limits.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iv) Check compliance with the maximum personal contribution limits.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- e) For both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) contributions reported in the candidate's campaign finance report (not including the \$5 qualifying contributions) and agree to supporting documentation, which reflects the name of the contributor (for all contributions) and for individuals who contributed greater than \$100, which reflects the contributor's address, occupation and employer.

Finding

No contributions were reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance reports during the reporting period.

- (i) For other types of cash receipts reported on the candidate's campaign finance reports, review supporting documentation and review for compliance with regulatory rules and laws and agree the receipt to inclusion in the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) For in-kind contributions, review the supporting documentation and determine the methodology utilized to value the contribution and assess the reasonableness.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- f) For both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) of cash expenditures reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports and perform the following:

- (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance reports.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- Agree the amount of the expenditure to the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- g) Determine whether any petty cash funds have been established and, if so, determine how expenditures from these funds have been reflected in the accounting records. Determine whether aggregate petty cash funds exceed the limit of \$1,800.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- (i) If applicable, for both the primary election and the general election, contractor will judgmentally select a 10% sample size with a minimum of five (5) candidate's petty cash fund expenditures and obtain supporting documentation for the expenditure. Determine whether the expenditure was for a direct campaign expense and whether the expenditure was in excess of the \$210 limit on petty cash expenditures.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- h) Determine if the candidate/campaign incurred any debt. If so, report all debt.

Finding

We were unable to establish communication with the Candidate; and as such, did not receive any items from the Candidate. As a result, we were unable to perform the test described above.

- i) Contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the preliminary engagement findings and recommendations that the Contractor anticipates presenting to the CCEC. During this conference, the Contractor will advise the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) of their right to respond to the preliminary findings and the projected timetable for the issuance of the final issuance of the report.

Finding

We reported our findings to the Candidate and the Candidate did not provide responses to our findings.
