Once you get past the -- in my view, and Mike 2 can speak to this too, once you get past the seed money 3 caps, which are pretty complicated, right, like how 4 much money you can take -- how much money you yourself 5 can give, how much money your family can contribute, 6 there's some -- and then how much overall seed money 7 you can take, that's probably, I think, the most complicated part of the underlying money piece. - 16 Typically you've got some affirmative
- 17 statutory authority. Typically you don't take on
- 18 statutory silence as a basis for a new power.
- 19 Typically you've got some notice. Typically you've got
- 20 some effort at alignment with election officials.
- 21 Typically you avoid late cycle changes that affect
- 22 voter registration systems. Typically you try to
- 23 balance the First Amendment interests with the state
- 24 interests, rights of voters, parties, and other, right.
- 25 You're trying to be predictable, you're trying to be

- 1 the party is involved in a quintessential state --
- 2 state action. Elections are state action, period.
- 3 There's not -- you know, you can't get around that by
- 4 delegating, you can't get around that by -- by, you
- 5 know -- so parties have First Amendment rights
- 6 absolutely, but they aren't absolute rights.
- And then again, you know, there's a
- 8 unilateral benefit to one party, which is sort of odd.
- So that's really -- you know, boiling all the
- 10 words I wrote down to it is -- the principles, I think,
- 11 that you can extract from them, this is an irregular
- 12 decision.
- 13 The next -- I guess we can go to the next
- 14 slide.
- 15 So we anticipate some legislative action on
- 16 this, some judicial action. There are pros and cons to
- 17 both. I tried to sort of outline them. You know, I
- 18 think that the big -- you know, I think you can imagine
- 19 the pros. Some kind of statutory clarity, as Gina will
- 20 talk later. You know, this is -- this is, right now,
- 21 an ongoing issue for this party in particular and maybe
- 22 an ongoing issue statutorily, but, you know, the
- 23 other -- but there are problems with -- you've got to
- 24 try to make -- if you want to undo this decision,
- 25 you've got to try to make it retroactive, you've got to

- 1 transparent, you're trying to be consistent, right. I
- 2 mean, these are pretty universally, I think,
- 3 acknowledged principles.
- So, you know, to boil what I've -- what I've
- 5 written down, if we go to the next one, here we've got
- 6 an action taken in the face of statutory silence that's
- 7 treated as creating authority. We have no notice of
- 8 the pending decision. It's unilateral. The
- 9 legislative structure are not considered in any record
- 10 we've seen. It's late. I mean, for purposes of voter
- 11 registration -- granted there may be a push to register
- 12 more voters over the first quarter of, you know, of
- 13 2026 leading up to the primary. But nevertheless,
- 14 we're, you know, something like three quarters of the
- 15 way through signature gathering.
- And then the way the memo, that I believe you
- 17 all had a copy of, frames this is as a near-absolute
- 18 First Amendment right on the part of the party, which
- 19 is inconsistent with the position the State had taken
- 20 up until literally July, when the Ninth Circuit said,
- 21 no, in fact, where there's a legitimate interest in
- 22 voter confusion, in administration of elections, all
- 23 that stuff, the question is what the burden is on the 24 party in comparison to that, not just the party's sort
- 25 of unilateral right to do -- to do anything, because

- 11 Secretary of State's Office, assuming there's someone
- 12 with, you know, proper standing to bring the action.
- 13 So, you know -- you know, so if we could move
- 14 to the next slide then.
- 15 You know, we kind of think you've got to --
- 16 you know, in terms of looking at this not necessarily
- 17 just from the Commission perspective, but how this
- 18 issue ought to be addressed if you're -- if you're, you
- 19 know, of the belief -- that memo makes pretty clear
- 20 it's staff's belief that this is a bad decision. You
- 21 know, you've kind of got to look at both of the ways
- 22 you can -- can address it if it's going to be
- 23 addressed, you know.
- 24 You know, it -- you know, we don't -- we
- 25 don't and haven't typically had a lot to say about this

- 1 level of administrative decision. But I think, as
- 2 Chairman Kimble said, because this, you know, directly
- 3 impacts voter education efforts, we have already heard
- 4 from County Recorders about their concerns because
- 5 there's not -- I mean, I'm not aware of, at this point,
- 6 like any public document on the Secretary's website
- 7 that says, X is going to happen on Y date. These --
- 8 you know, these things are all going to happen on this
- 9 date. Like, you know -- like the map, the way forward,
- 10 right, and how that's -- how that's going to work, I
- 11 don't know that that's been made available. If it is,
- 12 I don't -- I don't -- I don't have it.
- 13 And I'm not necessarily saying I should have
- 14 it. But if you're going to go from on date -- on today
- 15 to December 1 where some number of voters who are
- 16 current members of the No Labels Party, so the 40,000
- 17 folks or whatever, are going to be American Independent
- 18 Party people, and then once the MVD website changes,
- 19 right, that's where something -- I can't remember the
- 20 exact statistic anymore, but -- was it 90? It's a very
- 21 large percentage of people register there. I mean,
- 22 that's a -- that's -- once that goes online, I mean,
- 23 that's instantaneously going to, you know, bring about
- 24 this -- you know, this confusion.
- And we know from the California experience

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- So I think that, you know, all other debate
- 2 aside, I think that's a pretty -- that's a pretty big
- 3 stake that we have in this decision and making sure
- 4 that everybody gets it right, so...
- CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Thank you, Tom.
  - Gina, do you want to weigh in on this now?
- 7 MS. ROBERTS: Yes. Mr. Chairman,
- 8 Commissioners, thank you. I don't have slides, but I
- 9 will just jump in and speak to the voter education
- 10 components of this.

- I want to start by providing a little bit of
- 12 background on the voter registration process. And so I
- 13 know in the ED Report Tom shared with you the current
- 14 voter registration statistics, and I just wanted to
- 15 highlight that the No Labels Party has less than
- 16 1 percent of registered voters, of our electorate. And
- 17 then we have this other category that is referred to as
- 18 "other," as you'll see in the ED Report, and that is
- 19 the second highest bloc, coming in at 34.37 percent.
- 20 So the other names on there, Republican,
- 21 Democratic, Libertarian, No Labels, and Green, those
- 22 are what we call recognized parties. They have gone
- 23 through a process to obtain recognition at the state
- 24 level to appear on the statewide ballot. So they have
- 25 that precious ballot real estate.

- 1 that, you know, we cited in the memo, you know, that a
- 2 similar situation 10 years ago, something on the order
- 3 of 73 percent of folks believed they were registered in
- 4 the -- believed they were not a party, they were an
- 5 independent, and nevertheless ended up in a party
- 6 called the American Independent Party.
- So I think that's -- that's sort of the
- 8 policy landscape as we see it. I'm happy to answer
- 9 questions about that from -- from you, obviously. And
- 10 then Gina, I think, has some -- I think has given some
- 11 real serious thought to the voter education strategy
- 12 around this and support.
- 13 The one other thing I would note, you know,
- 14 is that, you know, whatever anybody thinks about our
- 15 voter education authority, the Clean Elections
- 16 Commission Voter Education Guide is the only thing that
- 17 comes from the State that goes to every single voter in
- 18 the state ahead of the primary. So, you know -- so
- 19 even if you say, well, you don't -- this isn't
- 20 mandatory, that's not mandatory, that's optional, you
- 21 don't have to deal with all of that, the fact is that
- 22 the last word that anybody is going to hear from the
- 23 State of Arizona about this issue and how to address it
- 24 as a voter is going to be in the primary election Voter
- 25 Education Guide.

- Any -- when a voter registers to vote, if
- 2 they do not select one of those recognized parties,
- 3 they are lumped into this category called "other."
- 4 That could be an independent voter, someone who is
- 5 unaffiliated with a party; it could also be a voter who
- 6 considers themselves a member of a party that does not
- 7 have statewide recognition, such as the Constitution
- 8 Party that you might see active in other states.
- So a voter who, again, is not registered with
- 10 one of those recognized parties, they are in this
- 11 "other" category, and that's what we often refer to as
- 12 independent voters, and that makes up a very large bloc
- 13 of our electorate. We've seen in Arizona history where
- 14 it's been the highest voting bloc in Arizona.
  - So when we are considering what this impact
- 16 will be in terms of the name change, first -- and Tom
- 17 sort of alluded to this -- I want to stress that this
- 18 is not a simple fix. It is not a one and done. It is
- 19 ongoing voter education. This is something that will
- 20 continue to cause voter confusion several election
- 21 cycles from today, because we have a 30- -- three
- 22 decades, 30 years of history in Arizona using the term
- 23 independent and what that stands for. We've trained 24 voter -- or, not we've trained. But voter behavior has
- 25 been produced because of that terminology and what it

2 So as Tom had mentioned too, trying to stay 3 away from the term independent, when we've had it 4 engrained in Arizona voter -- in their behavior, it's 5 just really not feasible. And to say that it belongs 6 to a recognized party now, again, it causes -- it's 7 going to cause mass confusion.

1 means and how they interact with the voting process.

So the way that we are viewing this from a 9 strategic standpoint in terms of how do we educate 10 Arizona voters across the state and future voters, it 11 really comes down to this is not so much an awareness 12 campaign. We don't look at it as a, you know, stop 13 what you're doing, state of Arizona, look at this 14 change. One, that just wouldn't be an effective use of 15 dollars. And two, it really highlights a particular 16 party, it brings, you know, emphasis to this, and we're 17 not promoting a party.

Really we need to look at this as procedural 19 voter education, identifying each of the touch points 20 that the voter will interact with through the voting 21 process. First and foremost is going to be that voter 22 registration process. As Tom had mentioned, the 23 majority of voters do utilize the online system, the 24 MVD system. So when you're going through that system 25 you get a dropdown, and in the dropdown there are

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- 1 an independent ballot. An independent ballot does not
- 2 exist in the primary, where you have all party
- 3 candidates on there. But now we would be telling
- 4 voters, well, there's the Arizona Independent
- 5 Party ballot, and that might cause confusion about what
- 6 they expect to see on that ballot. Do they expect to
- 7 see just AIP candidates, or do they expect to see what
- 8 has commonly been referred to as an independent ballot,
- 9 again, that doesn't exist, but are they expecting to
- 10 see all party candidates on there.

This could cause confusion and delays at

12 polling places. We would have to train poll workers

13 how to interact with this. Is there any recourse for

14 the voter if they, you know, said, you know, that's

15 really -- that's not how I registered to vote. That's

16 not what I meant. When voters are filling out a paper

17 form, they're -- the Counties right now and the

18 Secretary of State's Office and looking at the Election

19 Procedures Manual, they're working through clarifying

20 language about what voter intent means. When they

21 write something on the form, did they truly mean, oh, I

22 want to be unaffiliated, that type of independent, or

23 do I want to be recognized AIP party. So we'll see,

24 again, touch points there that we need to provide

25 procedural voter education on for our voters.

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- 1 fields that you can select. Effective December 1st,
- 2 from our understanding, is that dropdown will reflect
- 3 these new changes. However, there's really no source
- 4 for voters to go to to understand what those dropdowns
- 5 mean and the path it now sets them on going forward.

Once a voter gets registered, then really the

7 next point of impact that we're seeing here could be,

8 you know, who are they eligible to sign petitions for

9 if they're supporting a candidate. You know, are they 10 truly an independent voter, are they truly unaffiliated

11 and they can sign anybody's petition, or are they part

12 of a recognized party now under the No Labels AIP party

13 and can only sign those candidates. So we'll see a

14 touch point there.

15 And then we'll also see a touch point -- and 16 this is where we're going to see a lot of stress and 17 pain is in the primary election. So, again, we've had

18 30 years of our open primary system, where an

19 unaffiliated voter, an independent voter, can make a

20 party ballot selection. And so that's really important

21 there, it is a party ballot selection, because in

22 primaries the ballots are created by a recognized

23 party.

24 So we've had 30 -- a 30-year history now of 25 telling independent voters, there is no such thing as

Page 25 And then going back to candidates, we'll also

2 see education needs there. Because does a candidate

3 understand, hey, if I want to run for office, do I

4 go -- what we call the statute, the 16-341 process,

5 which is the process for unaffiliated candidates,

6 independent candidates, to qualify for the general

7 election ballot. They're not on the primary ballot.

8 Or does the candidate decide, hey, I want to run under

9 this AIP banner now, but I'm now in a primary and could

10 potentially be primarying other AIP candidates if we

11 run for the same -- same office and I have to win that

12 and advance to the general election. What does that

13 mean for the clean candidates. Do they understand,

14 well, which path you're going down, you know,

15 determines the funding you're eligible for. So there's

16 going to be voter education on that front too.

17 So, again, we really look at this as it's not

18 a one and done. It's going to be an ongoing voter

19 education issue. We will see lots of confusion from

20 voters.

The other thing that I want to point out is

22 the media. Again, we've had our open primary system

23 since 1998. We have a significant amount of

24 independent voters who are not participating in the

25 primary election. A lot of that comes down to -- they

- 1 often say, I didn't realize that I could or I didn't
- 2 realize the process, especially if I'm a mail-in voter,
- 3 that I have to actively tell my Recorder which
- 4 party ballot that I want. Oh, I don't get a
- 5 single ballot that has all the, you know, candidate
- 6 names on there? I'm an independent. I don't want to
- 7 associate with a party.
- 8 So when the media is covering elections, we
- 9 have to make sure that they are educated as well on
- 10 this nomenclature, on the terminology, and what it
- 11 means and the different pathways for each voters.
- 12 So there's -- there's a lot that is impacted
- 13 by this decision, and we are currently right now
- 14 communicating with our election colleagues, with the
- 15 County Recorders. As Tom mentioned, this change is
- 16 going into effect December 1st. Our immediate goal
- 17 would be, for those voters who are going to be updating
- 18 or new registrants, once this change goes into effect,
- 19 that they have some clarity on what their choices mean.
- 20 So we are looking at right now kind of
- 21 documenting what those pathways are, ideally getting
- $22\,\,$  something up on our website as soon as possible, and
- 23 then developing educational assets to help explain that
- 24 voter registration touch point. So, again, if you
- 25 choose, you know, to register to vote as a Republican,

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- 1 little elaboration on that as an independent. Both as
- 2 a Member of this Commission and also I work as a poll
- 3 worker in every election for, I don't know, more than
- 4 10 years, and independent voters are already confused.
- 5 When they show up, particularly in a primary, as you --
- 6 as you mentioned, Gina, they don't know if they can
- 7 vote. And most of the time, in the vast majority of
- 8 time, they don't vote, despite our best efforts to
- 9 educate independent voters that they can vote. Then
- 10 they get in there and they're asked, which party do you
- $11\,$  want and do you want a ballot for, and that further
- 12 confuses them.
- And so there's already a lot of confusion for
- 14 independent voters, and this is just going to multiply
- 15 it -- I can't even say how badly. It's going to just
- 16 make it confusion times 10 if this -- if this proceeds.
- 17 Do any Member of the Commission wish to ask
- 18 Tom or Gina any questions?
- 19 COMMISSIONER CRUMP: Mr. Chairman.
- 20 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Commissioner Crump.
  - COMMISSIONER CRUMP: Yeah, thank you. I do
- 22 have what I think is an important, at least for me, an
- 23 important threshold question before we get into the
- 24 merits on this argument. And that is, I want to
- 25 understand the Commission's options/authority on this

- $1\,$  here is the pathway it sets you on for the primary. If
- 2 you choose to register as an independent unaffiliated
- 3 other voter, this is the pathway that you are sent on.
- 4 And then if you choose to register to vote with the
- 5 Arizona Independent Party, this is the pathway it sets
- 6 you on for the primary.
- We are hoping to collaborate with our County
- 8 Recorders and develop -- or, work with them in
- 9 potentially work -- work groups, meetings to
- 10 collaboratively create these educational tools and
- 11 resources for voters. And I think, you know, we've
- 12 seen a lot of asks from our election colleagues here,
- 13 they are looking for this support. So as part of our  $\,$
- 14 efforts to provide voter education to the entire state,
- 15 it really is critical that they get that first step of
- 16 voter registration correct, that it's what they truly
- 17 want, and that they understand the pathway it sets them
- 18 on when they are interacting with a primary election.
- 19 So that's, again, sort of our strategic
- 20 viewpoint on how to tackle this issue, which will,
- 21 again, be ongoing. But with that, I'm happy to answer
- 22 any questions that the Commission may have.
- 23 CHAIRMAN KIMBLE: Thank you, Gina.
- 24 If I could summarize what Gina said in one
- 25 word, it's confusion. And I'd like to just give a

23 party can register only as stated in 16-801. So I

24 think the statute has been made clear. And if the

25 Legislature wanted to have a way to simply amend your

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 $1\,$  question is this. I think that, from an organizational

4 the petition process. I'm not aware of any other way

5 they could do that simply by being a -- having a

 $12\,\,$  as a party or some other ban were put in place that,

13 you know, said you can't have a confusing name or

14 whatever you want to -- whatever you want to say --

15 which I'm not sure you actually need that ban. I'm not

16 sure that's not implicit in the -- in a rational

17 reading of the statutory scheme, right. I mean, but

18 put that aside for a second. I think the burden would

19 be on them to show --

20 Well, the first question would be, is that a

21 significant burden on them such that it would be

22 subject to strict scrutiny, in which case they would

23 probably win. That's the first step. But if it's not

24 subject to strict scrutiny, then the analysis proceeds

25 to look at the burden on them versus the state's

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1 name as a party, they could have done that.

2 So I also want to make the Commission aware

3 that just recently -- well, at some time in the past,

4 the New York Legislature passed a ban on using the term

5 "independent" in a political party name. But just in

 $\ensuremath{\text{6}}$  August of this year, a candidate challenged that, and

7 the Federal Second -- Second Circuit Court of Appeals

8 upheld the law and said it's not a violation of his 9 First and Fourth Amendments. So I think that's very

10 useful to us.

11 I am -- I am interested, I guess, to know

12 what staff might say. Are there any particular

13 problems regarding a federal party -- I don't know how

14 that works when you've got somebody registered as a

15 federal -- a national party, and if they have

16 independent in their name and then they want to be that

17 party in Arizona. So, you know, there's the

18 national -- Libertarian National Party, for example,

19 and then there's the Libertarian Party of

20 Massachusetts, so -- but if a national party had

21 independent in its name and we somehow banned the use

22 of independent, how does -- how does that affect them

23 on the state level?

24 MR. COLLINS: Mr. Chairman,

25 Commissioner Crump, the way I would address that

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1 interest, and that is a -- you know, that can be 2 unpredictable certainly, but that's how the analysis

3 would proceed.

4 So if an absolute ban on a particular word

5 was considered to be a severe burden, then that

6 would -- that would -- I mean, even though you apply

7 strict scrutiny, it would effectively end the analysis

8 under the -- under the First Amendment test. And if

9 it -- if it's not a severe burden, then you get into

10 this more balancing test, that state's -- a state's

11 interest, and it sounds like -- I have not read the

12 Second Circuit case you mentioned, but it sounds like

13 that's what -- the analysis they undertook there with

14 respect to that -- that issue.

15 You know, I didn't have -- I have not done a

16 full rundown of every database to determine what has

17 happened. I do know, from the No Labels Party's own

18 memo, that people have changed their name to

19 Independent Party in other states. The memo itself,

20 which is -- the entire record here, administrative

21 record, as far as I can tell, is the letter from Paul  $\,$ 

22 Johnson to the Secretary and the Secretary's letter to

23 Paul Johnson back. There is no other record. And24 tracking down the circumstances of those name changes

25 was not something I was able to do easily, and the --

# Page 42 1 and the letter doesn't tell you what the process was, 2 what the other existing law was, what -- the timing of 3 it, all that other kind of stuff.
